Friendly Service: Keeping in Touch, Lending a Hand

Our Friendly Unit is comprised of one or two volunteers representing each of our eight school districts in Livingston County. We are happy to report that all eight districts are now covered.

Our purpose is to maintain contact with retired members who reside in our area, especially those over 90, and those in nursing homes or homebound. We contact them with "thinking of you" cards, notes, phone calls, and visits. Cards are sent during the December holiday season and for birthdays. The 90+folks are often given a small gift

and a visit on these occasions – sometimes a small party. We also send get-well and sympathy cards.

Our volunteers keep track of what they do during the year and every December a simple report is filled our and forwarded to our zone Friendly Chair.

We also coordinate funds. Money is available through the state that may be used to assist a member in financial need for a home repair like roof repairs or furnace repairs.

The Barrie Fleegle Grant, has been given to actively employed

teachers who are taking ed. classes or completing an advanced degree and are actively involved in community projects. Several teachers from schools in our county have received this grant.

Pat Muscarella and I co-chair our Friendly Service Unit and also maintain contact with member retirees in the York-Leicester School District. We appreciate and send a thank you to all our volunteers.
